Staff training

This academic year, Miss Sabin has led training to all staff about adaptations in the classroom. While these support our pupils with SEND, they are also valuable for all. Good teaching for children with SEND is good teaching for all.

Some of the adaptations we have looked at are:

- Word banks in lessons with key spellings.
- Sentence starters to support children in starting their task.
- Flexible seating plans
 The use of software. All Chrome Books now have the Clicker app installed on them.

We are passionate about how we can support our learners across all areas of the curriculum.

What are... Visual Timetables?

No one likes to be uncertain about what happens in their day, and children are no different. The use of timetables extends throughout life- and with good reason! Knowing what comes next helps us to mentally prepare for the day. It can inspire us to get through the tough parts in anticipation of the better parts. Additionally, children benefit from this as they have not got a fully developed sense of time yet, and it helps to build their awareness of time passing.

At Laughton All Saints' every classroom has a visual timetable which the teacher goes through with pupils each day. This particularly helps pupils with attachment-based challenges, autism or anxiety, but all pupils benefit from predictability of the day.
