

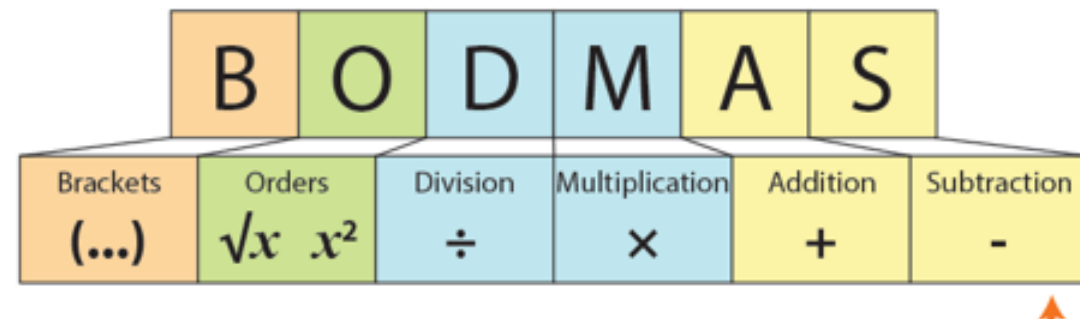

<p>English Punctuation and paragraphs</p> <p><i>Fix the punctuation in the Nowhere Emporium extract.</i></p>	<p>English Using commas and brackets</p> <p><i>If the information in the brackets is a full sentence, remember to punctuate it with a capital letter and full stop.</i></p> <p><i>Parenthesis is extra information which can be added using brackets, dashes or commas. It can be removed and the sentence will still make sense. Look out for examples in your reading book.</i></p>	<p>English Using bullet points</p> <p>There is no set rule about whether bullet points should start with capital letters but you must be CONSISTENT.</p>	<p>English Using hyphens and dashes</p> <p>Hyphens and dashes look the same but hyphens don't have spaces around them. They are used to join words together.</p> <p>Dashes are used for parenthesis. They have spaces around them and can come as a pair or alone, depending where they are in the sentence. Order of Operations

*	**	***
$16 + 23 - 11$	$14 \times (5-3)$	$45 + 4 \times 3$
9^2	$36 - 4^2$	$75 + (9^2 - 35)$
80^2	$5^2 \times 2 - 1$	$(32 \div 4) \times (76 - 3^2)$



HELP - Do anything in brackets first. Then look for any orders (powers such as squared or cubed numbers, or square roots). Then look to see if there is any multiplication or division to do next.

REMEMBER – \times and \div have the same value (See how they are both blue above) so if your calculation has both in, then do whichever one comes first. The same goes for $+$ and $-$, which are both yellow above.

TIP – cross parts of the calculation out as you solve it, and jot new values above.

Some high schools may refer to this as BIDMAS (I representing 'indices' – it still means the same thing).
